In addition to touring and becoming aware of MedicAlert's original function, District 4-A1 Lions and guests were introduced to a new program called "No Child Without/Safety Ever After. This program, originally started in Canada, offers free medical identification bracelets to children between the ages of 4 to 14. Dr. Martin Kabat, President of MedicAlert Foundation, outline how MedicAlert is hoping to build a close relationship with the Lions Clubs of the United States to become partners in this program. With the cooperation of the Turlock Schools, the program is already functioning in the schools of this area. It is hope that Lions Clubs throughout District 4-At will join in instituting this plan in their own communities. We have the opportunity to be in on the ground floor of an enterprise which it is hoped, with the assistance of Lions Clubs, will eventually spread throughout the

Lions International District 4-A1 Outstanding Club Humanitarian Service Award

Mission Statement: To recognize/acknowledge an individual Lions Club for participation and assistance in humanitarian efforts for the disabled and disadvantaged on a personal, local or global level.

Involvement Criteria:

- 1. Schools or health centers, self-help centers (i.e. Eye Foundation, blind Centers, Community Centers, City of Hope, et al).
- 2. Decoders for the deaf.
- 3. Hearing aids, prosthesis, eye care.
- 4. Financial aid to the destitute.
- 5. Educational funding
- 6. Involvement and/or coordination with other organizations or clubs in projects, (i.e. "AIDS", water, sight, climate, et al).
- 7. Aid to disasters, domestic and foreign; children's clinics, orphanages, water/sanitation projects, et al.
- 8. High membership numbers and man-hours associated with project participation.
- 9. Eyeglass collection.
- 10. Member outreach to solicit and/or identify people/community in need of services.

Selection Process: Clubs must be prepared to submit a detailed application for this award to the Committee Chairman and District Governor in sufficient time to permit review and selection prior to the District Convention.

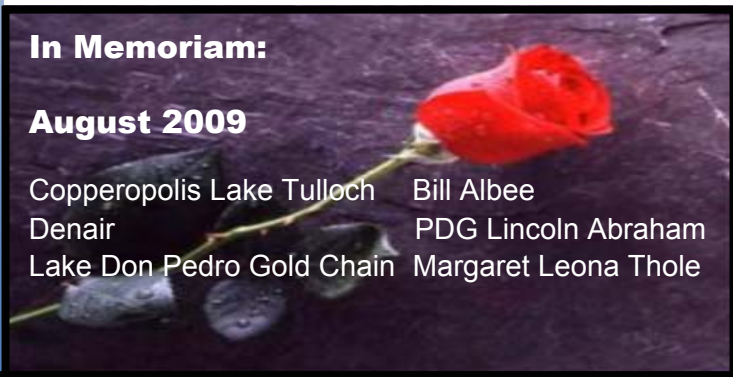

Lincoln B. Abraham PDG

June 29, 1915 –
September 2, 2009

Lincoln Abraham was born in the village of Digala, Persia, to Sophia and Baba Abraham. He passed away at Emanuel Medical Center at 94 years of age.

He grew up in Turlock and

Denair and graduated from Denair High in 1935. When WWII broke out, he enlisted in the US Army, eventually reaching the rank of Master Sergeant, serving as an airplane mechanic. After the war service, he came home and married Elizabeth Isaac in 1946. They settled in Turlock and then Denair where he farmed and then established a labor contracting business. Member of American Legion, VFW, Guild Winery, Blue Diamond Almond Growers and CA Farm Bureau, as well as St John’s Assyrian church and Turlock Assyrian Club. Also member and elder at First Presbyterian Church. Lifelong member of Denair Lions Club and was elected District Governor of Lions District 4-A1 in 1973-74. He was one of the cofounders of the Lions Eyemobile and of the All Star Football Game. He was on the Eyemobile board during the transition from the trailer to the 82 Winnebago (*Per Lion Allen Hoek*). He served in every Lions position from club secretary to club president, and all Lions District Zone positions. Also 32nd degree Mason. He is survived by his son Robert Abraham, also a Lion. Any remembrances or donations may be made to the Shriners Crippled Children’s Hospital, Lions District 4-A1 Eyemobile, or the building fund at the First Presbyterian Church

Chronological History:

1917 First Board of Directors on Oct 8-10, 1917 parceled the country out into districts for the organization and administration of Lions Clubs, and appointed a District Governor over each one. The districts were numbered from the Pacific Coast eastward. At that time, California and Nevada, along with Washington and Oregon were considered the 1st District.

1921 In 1921, after the Convention in Oakland, CA, the whole country was redistricted and these states became known as District 4. As other districts were formed, either from territory theretofore undistricted, or from states segregated from

MD-4 HISTORY

Anyone have an idea when District 4-A1 was formed? Well I managed to get some history from LCI. First Clubs organized 1917 Oakland, CA and 1920 Reno, NV.



FLOOD RELIEF TAIWAN

(LCI Website)

More than 83 inches of rain from Typhoon Morakot fell across Taiwan, causing massive flooding and making immediate relief efforts difficult. As of August 17, 500 are estimated dead and many remain stranded. Most of the casualties were in hardest-hit Kaohsiung County. It is estimated that the storm caused the most damage to the island in 50 years.

Lions are responding, bringing help to those who need it most. LCIF has awarded nine emergency grants of US \$10,000 each, totaling US \$90,000 to nine districts for Lions to provide immediate relief and purchase necessary provisions. Additionally, LCIF has awarded a US \$100,000 Major Catastrophe Grant for immediate relief or long-term reconstruction.

Lions around the world can help by donating to an account designated for this disaster "Typhoon Morakot, Multiple District 300, Taiwan." **The LCIF Executive Committee has approved Melvin Jones Fellowship recognition for designated donations over US \$1000 for this disaster through February.**



So if you are planning to give a MJF in the year, you could contribute to this fund at the same time. That would help to start replacing the \$190,000 already awarded.

congested districts, they were given the lowest numbers then remaining open. Shortly after this, also in 1921, Washington and Oregon were separated from this District and became known as District 19. Hawaii was added to District 1 soon to be known as District 4 at this time. Hawaii was separated from District 4 in 1936 and became known as District 50.

1922 Presently we have 3 clubs which were formed in this year, but 4-A1 did not exist yet: Sonora, Stockton Host, and Modesto. We recently lost Merced Host which was another one from this era. There are probably others from that time which no longer exist.

1937-38 District 4, divides into Multiple District 4 composed of 5 sub-Districts known as 4-A, 4-B, 4-C, 4-D, and 4-E.

Lions District 4-A1

Technology Update: (September 2009) (Update of Hand-Out from 1st District Meeting)
by Lion Ron Raines, District Technology Chair.

Goal:

To spread the use of internet technology within our district Lions Clubs for the betterment of Lionism.

Definition:

The use of the internet includes e-mail and websites. Communicating Lion business and sharing ideas. Helping other Lions and clubs to improve their knowledge and ability to use internet technology for Lionism.

The BIG Idea: (Year 2)

Out of 62 clubs in our district, ALL now have working websites. Go to our district website and click the button: "Clubs". Lion Ron wants to help the clubs maintain those websites with a growing number of clubs becoming self-sufficient. He will either advise or maintain (edit) web pages for clubs. He will travel to your area to do instruction. Some sites are independent, using their own host. Some are using the district host plan (Bravenet.com) described in the next section. And, some are hosted by the district website using a sub-domain under the district domain name.

Example: Lodi.Lions4-a1.org This name is not easy to "tell" people or remember. However, it works fine. Easier is LodiLions.org (Lodi Lions dot org). This is one good reason to be a paid participant on the district hosting plan. Clubs can find their own host, as some have done.

The cost:

Unless one finds a "free" host for your website, it is necessary to pay for your hosting and domain name. Domain names cost about \$10 per year. A domain name is the address of your website such as: legrandlions.org A host is a company with a special computer which is called a server. Hosting typically cost \$50-100 per year. But, by using Lion Ron's host administrator skills, we can offer club website hosting at \$10 per year. We receive a discount by doing the contract for 5 years. So our name and hosting is \$100 for 5 years.

FLASH: (January 2009) Our district now has a "non-profit" license for web page writing/editing software, **Expression Web 2**. This lists for \$249-299. Your club price: \$45. You will need this, if you are ready to edit your club web pages. Otherwise you may wait until then. Lion Ron has plenty of copies. Contact Lion Ron: ronraines@comcast.net

FLASH: (September 2009) LionWAP has come out with a new website design modeled after the LCI website. It is a huge improvement over the past design. Lion Ron will be presenting the "pros and cons" of this method at the next district meeting. He will be glad to show you how to use it. Check it out at: <http://legrandca.lionwap.org>

Getting Started:

The district cabinet (treasurer) has agreed to collect the funds (\$100) from each participating club and pay for the hosting and domain names when billed. (online credit card)

- Upon payment, Lion Ron will contact the club representative to find out the domain name chosen and provide access to the website. He will train and/or do the webmaster duties for each club. Yes, you could do as little as send him the info in an e-mail and it will be posted!
- Clubs need to gather information about members, activities, dates, etc. Bulletin editors have this. It is very important to keep a separate list of members who have e-mail accounts. Unless members decline, it is great to list e-mail addresses with their names on your website. (Why not put e-mail addresses in your club bulletins? It identifies members with some computer skills.)

MD-4 History continued

1939-40 MD-4 divides from 5 sub-districts to form

6 sub-Districts to be known as 4-A, 4-B, 4-C, 4-D, 4-E, and 4-N.

1949-50 MD-4 divides from 6 sub-Districts to form 8 sub-Districts known as 4-A, 4-B, 4-C1, 4-C2, 4-C3, 4-D, 4-E and 4-N.

1950-51 MD-4 divides from 8 sub-Districts to form 11 sub-Districts to be known as 4-A, 4-B1, 4-B2, 4-C1, 4-C2, 4-D1, 4-D2, 4-E1, 4-E2, 4-G, and 4-N. 4-C3 disappears from listing at this time.

1955-56 Sub-district 4-B1 divides to form 2 new sub-Districts to be known at 4-B1 and 4-B3. Designation number changes 4-D1 to 4-D and 4-D2 to 4-H. MD-4 is now composed of 12 sub-Districts known as 4-A, 4-B1, 4-B2, 4-B3, 4-C1, 4-C2, 4-D, 4-E1, 4-E2, 4-G, 4-H, and 4-N.

1956-57 This is the big year when the sub-Districts went to "C", "A", and "L".

A to C1	C1 to A1	H to L2
B3 to C2	C2 to A2	E1 to L3
B1 to C3	G to A3	E2 to L4
B2 to C4	D to L1	N remains N

1957-58 Sub-District 4-C1 divides to form 2 new sub-Districts 4-C1 and 4-C5.

1963-64 Sub-District 4-C4 divided to form 4-C4 and 4-C6.

1963-64 Sub-Districts 4-L1, 4-L2, 4-L3, and 4-L4 divide to form 6 new sub-Districts 4-L1, 4-L2, 4-L3, 4-L4, 4-L5, and 4-L6.

1980-81 Sub-District 4-C2 divided to form 4-C2 and 4-C7. *(Some time in this decade(?) 4-C7 disappears but unable to determine exact year. ED)*

2005-06 Sub-District 4-N (Nevada) redistricts to become an independent single District 46. •
