1931-2009**

Guy Earlington Reynolds passed away peacefully in his home in Sutter Creek on December 4, 2009. He was born on February 18, 1931 in Chicago, Illinois the son of Albert E. and Izora (Dolly) Logan Reynolds. He graduated from Northwestern University with a degree in Chemical Engineering. He obtained his Law degree from St. Louis University. He married Jacqueline Joan Phillips September 4, 1954. He started as a private practice lawyer in 1963 in Placerville and eventually moved to Sutter Creek in 1965 with his family. He moved his practice to Jackson where he was working with his one true love, other than his wife and family, the law, until his last day.

Guy served in the Army during the Korean War in civilian intelligence based in Oklahoma. He was District Attorney for Amador County for 8 years in the 1970's and served as City Attorney for the cities of Lone and Plymouth for many years. Guy believed in service to his community and belonged to many service and fraternal organizations. He was on the Lions Club International Eye Foundation Board where he received the honor of Helen Keller Fellow. Additionally with Lions he served as his local club President, 4-A1 District Governor, was a Life Member of the Lions Youth Exchange, a Melvin Jones Fellow, a Fred W. Smith Fellow, and recipient of the Ernie Theobald Endowment for work at Camp Pacifica. As a Mason he held the offices of Junior Warden, Senior Warden, Secretary, and was Master of Henry Clay Lodge from 1971-1973. Guy was also a lifetime member of the Jackson Elks Lodge, Ben Ali Shriners, and American Legion.

Guy loved to cook and enjoyed cooking and barbecuing for his family and friends. He was very proud of his garden and had obtained the title of Master Gardener through the Amador County Master Gardeners Association. He was a member of the Early Risers Walking and Exercise Club of Sutter Creek. Even though he was a Midwesterner by birth, he was a Californian at heart and was very interested in anything to do with the history of the Old West, railroads, cowboys and gold mining. He was an active member of the Clampers group who dedicated many historic plaques throughout California and Nevada.

Guy was preceded in death by his parents and step mother Katherine Reynolds; son, Gregory E. Reynolds and stillborn infant daughter Laura E. Reynolds. He is survived by his wife of 55 years Jacqueline J. Reynolds; daughter Dinah E. Ordewald, her husband Christian and son David Ordewald of Staunton, VA; daughter-in-law Stephanie Reynolds of West Sacramento; son Grant E. Reynolds, *Continued page 6*

LCIF Responds to Haiti Earthquake

Dear Lions of District 4-A1:

A powerful 7.0 earthquake ravished the island nation of Haiti on the evening of Tuesday, January 12. Much of the capital city of Port-au-Prince has been destroyed. It's estimated that 3 million people, nearly one-third of the country's population, has been affected by the earthquake. The casualty numbers are not known at this time, but significant loss of life is feared. Rescue efforts remain ongoing at this time.

LCIF is responding to the Haiti earthquake. We are in contact with Lions leadership in the area to assess the situation and determine immediate relief needs. A US\$50,000 Major Catastrophe Grant has already been awarded to support immediate disaster relief efforts.

When catastrophes occur, LCIF and Lions answer the call for help. I have seen firsthand the impact large-scale devastation has on communities. Homes, schools, hospitals are destroyed and lives are often lost. Through our efforts, we are able to bring hope and healing, even if it's just a little bit, to people who are in such desperate need.

I ask that you help support LCIF disaster relief efforts in Haiti by making a contribution. A designated fund, "LCIF Haiti Earthquake Relief", has been established for donations for this disaster. It's through Lions' commitment to serving those in need that those suffering from the earthquake's devastation will receive some sense of normalcy.

Historic Partnership Opens New Opportunities for Service

Lions Clubs International and the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) have partnered in a historic and exciting Memorandum of Understanding (MOA). At the March 27, 2009 ceremony in Geneva, Switzerland, marking this joint venture, Past International President Albert F. Brandel explained how this natural collaboration evolved. "Lions Clubs International and its network of 44,000 clubs in 205 countries have long provided relief to victims of natural disasters." He believes that the agreement between the two global forces will "further strengthen our ability to respond in time of need and should be viewed as mutually beneficial."

According to IFRC Secretary General Bekele Geleta, "Well-trained volunteers can achieve positive and sustainable changes in their communities because they are there before, during and after disaster strikes. They can make a real difference in reducing the impact of disasters and play a vital role in empowering communities to be prepared for crisis." Lions will be able to participate in IFRC disaster preparedness training, which will in turn, work for the successful formation of Lions ALERT teams.

The Lions ALERT program, established in 2006, is intended to facilitate immediate response when urgency matters. It helps Lions develop a plan of action on three emergency levels—one, affecting a few people; two, affecting a community; and three, an emergency that affects hundreds or thousands of people in a region.

Lions are known for giving immediate attention when disaster strikes. A total of 25 percent of Lions clubs worldwide participated in disaster relief projects during 2007-08, quickly mobilizing to personally offer assistance, raise funds or otherwise be of help when an urgent situation arose. For nine months after the World Trade Center disaster in 2001, New York Lions worked round the clock to provide relief to first responders and families of those lost at Ground Zero. Lions also responded to the Southeast Asian tsunami, Hurricane Katrina and other worldwide natural disasters.

The Lions partnership with IFRC, whose historic timeline closely matches Lions Clubs International, will help ensure that crucial components of assistance

are not lost when disasters strike anywhere in the world. There will be many opportunities for Lions to learn disaster training—serving on an IFRC Community Advisory Council; organizing IFRC blood drives; helping to identify vulnerable populations within communities that would require extra assistance in case of disaster; assisting in IFRC community-wide emergency drills and now helping to educate the public about pandemic influenza.

Lions who complete IFRC disaster relief training and are credentialed relief workers can help perform a variety of services within their own communities. Since many clubs operate their own clubhouses, these would ideally serve as IFRC emergency shelters for victims and rescue workers in times of critical need and be staffed by trained Lions. Placing a Lions ALERT sign at the shelter would identify it as a place of safety for both volunteers and victims.

FIGHTING DIABETES

A recent University of Chicago study estimates that **DIABETES RATES WILL DOUBLE OVER THE NEXT 25 YEARS**. Here is some examination of this research from Dan Harley's new book, Diabetes Rising.

“Is diabetes becoming more common because Americans are getting heavier?”

Our weight has been inching up, but diabetes is five times more common now than it was during World War II. We're certainly not five times heavier. And Type 1 diabetes, an autoimmune disorder that wasn't traditionally associated with weight, is increasing by 2 to 3% each year.

How do scientists explain the increase?

There are several working hypotheses. One is the slight increases in weight do raise kids' risk of getting Type 1. Another is that a lack of vitamin D, the so-called sunshine vitamin, raises the risk of diabetes. Yet another is that because kids aren't exposed to as many germs these days, their immune systems are overly sensitive. And some environmental toxins, perhaps stored in fat, have also been linked to diabetes.

What are “diabetes clusters”?

Epidemiologists have started to notice that certain geographic areas – one in the Boston suburbs, for example- have particularly high rates of Type 1 diabetes in children. They don't yet know why, partly because diabetes is not a “reportable illness.” If you get measles, the doctor has to report that to the CDC. The same should be the case for Type 1 diabetes.

How else should we be fighting diabetes? Choices for healthy living should be as easy and accessible as fast food. Eating right and getting enough exercise is important for everyone, whether they have diabetes or not.” Parade Magazine, January 17, 2010, page 10. ●

No Child Without/Safely Ever After

As you learned from the last issue, this is a free program to protect children from ages 4 to 14 living with chronic conditions, allergies, or special needs. The memberships are given at no cost to the parent/guardian, school or the school district. This program is fully funded by MedicAlert and, at present, the Lions of District 4-A1.

The foundation is launching this program in the United States with its first partner school district in MedicAlert's hometown of Turlock, CA. MedicAlert hopes to expand this program to interested schools across the United States. *No Child Without* has been a successful program in Canada with more than 12,000 children in 1,500 schools now served and ongoing expansion to new schools planned.

No Child Without/Safely Ever After (SEA) will provide students with MedicAlert's 24-hour comprehensive emergency information services that safeguard and identify children in an emergency. Access to medical records is especially important when children are involved in an emergency because often they cannot speak for themselves, and a parent or caregiver may not be nearby.

So now that I have refreshed your memories, here are some FAQs:

What is the cost to participate in this program?

Participation in the SEA program is **FREE** to elementary school children ages 4 until their 14th birthday.

What happens when the child goes to another school not covered by MedicAlert Foundation?

Once enrolled, the program will continue to cover them until their 14th birthday.

What do I do if my child's MedicAlert ID is lost or stolen?

A one-time replacement is available at no cost. Thereafter, we will charge a nominal cost of \$14.90 for each standard MedicAlert ID. *Continued page 15*

Lions Clubs International is pleased to announce that it has entered into an agreement with Wal-Mart to collect used eyeglasses from the public at specified Wal-Mart and Sam's Club stores throughout the United States. This new program will enhance the Lions Eyeglass Recycling Program, enabling our association to collect increased quantities of usable glasses for humanitarian missions to developing nations.

- Commencing January-February 2010, co-branded collection boxes, bearing the LCI, Wal-Mart and Sam's Club logos, will be available in the 2,500 US Wal-Mart stores and approximately 500 Sam's Clubs, with vision centers. These new boxes will replace Lions collection boxes currently in place at the specified stores. For Wal-Mart stores and Sam's Clubs without in-store vision centers, existing Lions collections will continue at the discretion of the store managers.
- Wal-Mart will ship the collected eyeglasses to their distribution centers, where they will then be delivered to the nearest Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centers for sorting, cleaning and processing.
- Usable glasses will be available for Lions and other optical missions to developing nations, where the glasses will be dispensed to children and adults free of charge.
- The Lions/Wal-Mart co-branded program is aimed at members of the public. Wal-Mart and Sam's Club stores will not be able to accept or ship Lions club collections of eyeglasses from other locations in the community.

If you are involved in eyeglass collection, thank you for your continued support of this project. We encourage clubs to maintain their collection sites throughout the community and send the glasses to the nearest [Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center](#). What medical condition warrants a membership and identification?

Any pre-existing medical condition that an emergency responder or a physician should know about that could impede or change the protocol of care to the child.

These conditions include:

- Anaphylaxis or severe allergies to drugs, food, or insects
- Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD)
- Asthma
- Autism
- Diabetes
- Epilepsy
- Hearing or vision disorder
- Hemophilia

What do I do if my child's MedicAlert ID is lost or stolen?

A one-time replacement is available at no cost. Thereafter, we will charge a nominal cost of \$14.90 for each standard MedicAlert ID.

Why can't my school become a SEA school today?

SEA is a charitable program and is dependent on philanthropic gifts from donors. As funding becomes available, we work with the school districts to grow the program in each area. Once the school district identifies a school (or schools), we then meet with the principals to bring the program to your community.

Why do you have to work through the school board/school districts?

School boards/districts have the best understanding of the needs of their schools. We rely on them to select those schools in greatest need first.

Will we receive a notice to renew when my child turns 14?

Yes, parents will receive a notice 30 days prior to the child's 14th birthday that advises them the child has become eligible for the **Kid Smart** program.

What is Kid Smart?

This program was developed to offer a special student rate to ensure children and teenagers across the United States, with or without medical conditions, allergies or special needs are protected by MedicAlert Foundation.

Open to children up to age 18, whose schools are not enrolled with the **Safely Ever After** program, providing them with a cost effective option.

Initial enrollment fee is \$29.95 plus shipping and handling. This provides member with a **Kid** >>>>>>>>
